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

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Tom Kleist and Sandy Fisher mix humor and history in the programs they take to schools, community groups and service organizations. They call their presentation "Adventures with Ma and Pa" and they bring history alive in classrooms, churches and farm sheds across southeast Wisconsin as they teach about everyday life in the 1800's and early 1900's. Fisher says that she and Kleist represent a generation that still has a connection to life before modems; remembering outhouses, pitchforks and hand pumps – the things of early-day life that bear little resemblance to modern households or farms today.

Kleist is a former elementary school teacher and auctioneer, who also raises a few goats on his farm near Elkhorn. Fisher, who lives in Waukesha, was an accredited education coordinator and worked at Old World Wisconsin before retirement. Both found their niche in "Ma & Pa" and have



visited up to thirty schools a year with their blend of history and humor. In addition, they mix their comedy with historical props – tools and implements from another era – often asking their audiences to guess what the uses of each might have been. Both Fisher and Kleist are intent on sharing their stories and historical perspective with audiences young and old. 201 - BREED SAMPLES IN FELT

Heidi Bukoski – Instructor

6 HOURS



Ever wondered how the fleece of all those breeds of sheep differs? What is your best choice for soft garments; for sturdy vessels; for long-wearing rugs? What is meant by spongy wool? Participants

will make consistent, useful samples of a dozen breeds of sheep, ranging from fine to coarse fiber and from widely available to relatively rare (but still easily obtainable). This class is perfect for both the beginner - who will learn to make good felt - or an advanced felter who wants to experiment and learn about different breeds. Spinners and knitters or any fiber artist will also find these samples useful. (Breeds may differ from those pictured.) \$25 materials fee covers a dozen different breeds of wool, and all supplies for wet felting plus labeling and mounting supplies.

The first batt will be hand cranked before switching over to Electric Drive for the duration of class. Is the yarn in your head the yarn in your hand? Do you always spin the same yarn? Do you have a dream yarn you just can't make happen? Are you unhappy with what happens to the colors when you spin a

variegated top or roving? Do you love your handspun yarn, but don't like how it looks knitted? In this class, we'll focus on making yarn that inspires you from commercially dyed roving and top -- yarn you'll love to knit with. Together we'll build your yarn from fiber braid up to a knitted swatch. We'll start by talking about the blueprint for a yarn, the yarn vision. We'll break yarn down into all of its parts. We'll build your yarn's foundations by exploring fiber breeds and preparations. The walls they're the different drafting and plying methods we'll work with. Finally, the roof goes on as we manipulate variegated top and roving to get the colors you've chosen just the way you want them. All along the way you'll get tips to keeping your yarn's end use or yarn vision in mind and your yarn consistent. This class will give you confidence to build the yarns you want to knit with! \$35 materials fee covers a selection of different fibers and

preps, many dyed by independent dyers. Students get enough fiber to use in class and to practice class skills at home.

Students should bring: A spinning wheel in good working order, at least 3 bobbins, tags to mark samples, a lazy kate, niddy noddy and paper and pen to take notes.

Plying with wire and added textures will also be covered. The afternoon

will be spent creating wrapped cuff bracelets, i-cord focals, and miniature spool pendants to wear your yarn love with pride! \$20 covers 1 oz of blended fiber, 1 oz mix of dyed fleece & locks, lurex and other texture/effect thread/fibers, spool of wire, tension band for wire, and all jewelry components.

Wheels brought to class must be in excellent operating condition and completely assembled; no antique wheels.)

This is a 2-day class – Thursday & Friday



This two-day workshop is for the person who wants to jump right in and make a terrific looking braided rug from start to finish. So if you are a fiber artist with a closet full of fiber or a shepherd wishing to make

something unique from your wool sheep, you will enjoy this class. Using easy techniques and simple equipment, students will learn how to correctly braid the roving, felt the braids, and sew the braids into a beautiful, functional heirloom rug to be enjoyed now and to pass on to another generation. Day-one will be spent selecting and preparing the roving, talking about color/design options, then braiding enough roving for a small rug. Instructor will felt the braids that evening at a Laundromat and bring the felted braids back to class on the next day. Day-two will be spent learning the easy sewing techniques necessary to complete the project. Spiral or butted, oval or round, you will learn how easy it is to design and construct braided rugs that will make you proud. The instructor will have a color assortment of roving available for purchase at a reasonable price. Copies of the book "The Shepherd's Rug" and additional spools of waxed linen thread will also be available. \$25 materials fee covers an equipment kit that contains everything needed (except for wool roving) to complete the project including a spool of waxed linen thread.

Students should bring: Students should bring enthusiasm, knowing that they will finally be able to empty that closet

of all that unused fiber. This is a good way to use up that roving you don't know what to do with, you can always supplement with roving purchased from the instructor. You will need about 3-4 pounds for a 2'x3' rug in 3 or more shades or colors, long/coarse fibers are preferred, but any type can be used as long as it is not short stapled. Alpaca, llama, and mohair blends will work too, but are best if blended with about 20% wool. Roving "Top" can be used but may be difficult to felt solidly. Surprisingly, sticky roving or roving starting to cot works well too.

In this two-day class experience the fun of weaving on a 4-shaft loom. You will learn how to plan a project, prepare a warp, dress it onto a loom and weave. We will discuss the loom, learn how to read a

pattern draft as well as learn about some basic weave structures and finishing techniques. There will be many completed samples and projects for your inspiration. You will leave this class with your woven project (set of coasters or narrow table runner) and the knowledge to continue weaving on your own in this crash course on 4-shaft weaving! The instructor will contact you prior to class to find out what kind of loom you will be bringing or if you need one to use for class. She will also make sure you have the necessary weaving equipment (shuttles, warping board, etc) and answer any other questions about the class. This class is designed for the absolute beginner or can be used as a refresher course. Materials fee of \$15 covers the use of weaving equipment (and loom if you need one), handouts & warp and weft, threads/yarn.

Students should bring: 4-Shaft Loom & all necessary weaving equipment. A loom will be provided if you do not have one. Scissors, dressmaker's tape measure or small ruler, calculator, blunt, large-eyed tapestry needle.

301 - DRUM CARDING FINE FIBERS

Many fiber artists have trouble carding fine fibers. Most have problems with neps and noils. Others don't know when to card woolen or worsted - some do not know the difference. In this class we will work with fibers that are 25 micron or less: usually soft, short, and feel best next to the skin. Fibers such as: Ramboulllet, Merino, BFL, Targhee, Cormo, Alpaca, Cashmere, Paco Vicuna, Camel and Angora. We will share our experience with carding and storing these and other fibers. We encourage the students to bring clean fiber with all lanolin removed that they have had trouble carding and we will try to find solutions to help them. All students will work on Clemes and Clemes Elite Series Electric Drum Carders. Students may bring a drum carder for us to evaluate, time permitting. Students will card and take home five or six batts by the end of the class. \$75 materials fee covers all fiber carded during class.

Students should bring: An attitude for learning. All materials and equipment will be provided by the instructors.

In this class you will learn how to make a special mitten cuff and mitten based on traditional designs from the Estonian island of Kihnu in the Baltic Sea. Mary will share with you some of the techniques she

learned while on a knitting trip to Estonia, including various braids, textures, and two-color work. Knitting a mini mitten will give students a chance to learn these techniques first-hand. Students must have two-color knitting experience and be able to knit with fine yarns. No materials fee.

Students should bring: Three colors of sport-weight yarn (Naturespun Sportweight works nicely and black, natural, and red are traditional Kihnu mitten colors) and a set of five size 2 double pointed (dp) needles and one size 3 or

4 needle (used only for cast-on). Two circular needles or one long circular for magic loop can be used in place of dp, if preferred.

This type of rug hooking consists of pulling strips of wool material through a backing to create a design. This all day class will open up a whole new art form in working with wool and will offer students everything they need to know to begin hooking rugs. You will learn the art of rug hooking, including information about backings, frames, cutters and hooks and you will also learn about finishing your piece. \$35 materials fee covers the cost of handouts and a small kit consisting of a design on linen with enough hand-dyed wool cut into strips to complete the piece.

Students should bring: Small scissors, plus hook and a heavy 14 inch wooden hoop. If a student does not have a hook or a hoop, one will be provided.

304 - NATURAL DYES: ADDING IRON - HOW SAD CAN BE HAPPY!

Stefania Isaacson – Instructor 6 HOURS



The wide variety of colors from natural dyes can be greatly augmented by adding an iron post-mordant. In this class we will cover some of the basic natural dyes like cochineal, fustic, logwood, pomegranate, and madder and the effect that adding iron has

on the colors they give. We will cover some of the long history of these dyes, the mordanting process, and some color theory. Students will take home dyeing instructions, many samples, and information on each of the dyes used. No experience is necessary. \$30 materials fee covers all dyes, fiber to be dyed, all pots, cups, thermometers, etc. needed for dyeing, and extensive handouts and instructions.

Students should bring: Apron, rubber gloves, 2 old towels, paper towels, calculator, small baggies and marking pen, pen and paper.

Experience level recommended for this class: Beginning

305 - GRADIENT YARNS: A SPINNER'S STUDY IN SHIFTING SHADES

"Gradient: the relative increase or decrease in the magnitude of a property." Yarns with long color changes that shift slowly from one end of the skein to the other are a great spinner's challenge. There

We will hand card and hand comb some wool fleeces, and we will spin from these preparations as well as from commercially prepared

involve two or more colors, but only one color is used per row. In this class you will learn to follow written patterns and graphs, which are specific to this technique, how to work Mosaic knitting in the round and flat and with both knit and purl stitches, while you make an assortment of useful dish cloths. A pattern for the hat is included. \$3 materials fee covers patterns.

Students should bring: #8 straight or circular needles and 2 contrasting colors of worsted weight cotton yarn, 50 grams each. One should be Light colored and the other one darker. 

This is a 2-day class – Saturday & Sunday

If the Colonists had known about this, they wouldn't have wasted their time with Poke Berries! Mushrooms aren't just for eating: Certain types of fungi contain the chemistry necessary to provide unique color as pigment or dye. Learn which kinds work and are considered permanent colors. This workshop is an interactive activity and all participants will be expected to participate cooperatively to do the dyeing of yarns on both days. We will be working with yarns of wool and a few other fibers, which along with the mushrooms and handouts, will be provided by the instructor. Participants will be given a list of items to bring after registering. Everyone will go

home with approximately a pound of samples from all of the beautifully dyed yarns! \$45 materials fee covers all yarns, mordants, dye mushrooms, tags, labels, recipes and handouts. Yarns will be pre-mordanted by the instructor to avoid traveling with unnecessary chemicals on the airplane and to insure proper quality of the process.

A barbed, 36 gauge felt needle will be used to lock fibers into place using carded, roving white sheep wool and a pecking motion of your wrist to create a dry felted sheep form. We will use techniques to add hand dyed Coopworth locks

with curled tips to cover the form and give "Petunia" character. Details will be defined with 38-gauge needle and embellished with yarn, hand-dyed wood flower and hand-painted pin eyes. The techniques in this class will show you how to needle felt with roving, work with a frame for feet and add hand dyed locks to a needle felted form to create Petunia Pig. \$25 materials fee covers 36 and 38 gauge felt needle, horse shoe nail frame for feet, carded white roving, hand dyed Coopworth locks, eyes, wood flower and yarn for embellishment.

You'll spin yarns and knit samples that will show the effects of changing the color flow on variegated fibers. You'll learn ways to keep your yarn colors exactly the same as your fiber braid and the whys and how-tos of combining multiple variegated tops. In this class we'll explore: Mixing colors with plying, blending colors through drafting at the wheel, mixing 2 or more braids, the easiest way to choose multiple braids to mix for a hat or for a sweater, and how yarn size, fiber prep and your drafting style affects variegated yarns. This class will give you a better idea of how braid in hand looks after it's spun and knit After you spin in this class you'll never look at your stash the same way again. \$25 materials fee covers variegated fibers dyed by a well known independent dyer, along with coordinating fibers. Almost every spinner has tried fractal spinning with variegated fiber, but do you do it the same way every time? Fractal spinning for knitting has endless possibilities! What happens when you change the size of your fiber or use fiber dyed in different patterns? Fractal spinning hand dyed fiber

creates striping patterns that are beautifully complex, compared to a matching ply. Fractals are simply different sizes of the same pattern, in our case a line or stripe. In this class we'll work with hand dyed top to explore fractal color patterns. We'll start class by making a matching 2-ply yarn. Then we'll divide, and combining different color lengths, create fractally plied yarns that are intricately striped. We'll explore the effect of fractal plying on different styles of dyeing as well and see what happens

with gradient and randomly dyed fibers. Before we're done we'll play with plies to see what happens when working with more than 2 plies and a textured ply or two. We'll see what happens with our fractals when we change the size of our yarn. Fractal spinning comes alive when it's knit so we'll look at knitted samples to see the unique explosion of color that fractals create. This class moves at a fast pace, so come ready to spin! \$25 materials fee covers a custom dyed kit for fractal spinning.

Students should bring: A spinning wheel in good working order, at least 3 bobbins, tags to mark samples, a lazy kate, niddy noddy and paper and pen to take notes.

It has obvious uses for preparing washed fleeces for spinning and for blending already prepared fibers. We will cover these basics in this workshop. We will also explore less obvious blending techniques that will allow you to spin and create smooth yarns, fluffy yarns, gently textured yarns, and highly textured yarns. And, we'll explore ways of preparing fiber "paintings" that can then be wet felted. Get ready to be surprised and energized by this fantastic fiber tool! \$20 materials fee covers use of blending boards (provided by Clemes & Clemes, Inc.), use of blending board tools & accessories, fiber, samples for examination, notebook with handouts.

We will be using a beautiful, traditional indigo dye bath for our pieces (this is so much fun to watch). After learning the basics students will have the opportunity to put their skills to work and create another piece of their own design, thus reinforcing what they have learned. Guidance and examples will be provided. \$18 materials fee covers cotton Sateen fabric and all supplies for stitching and dyeing.

Before there were buttons and button holes, zippers or Velcro, clothing was held together with bands or tapes. Some were just plain linen tapes but the Pennsylvania Germans and many of the Scandinavian people made their tapes with beautiful patterns and colors with this warp faced weaving. Traditionally they used three types of looms: the box loom, a paddle loom and a gate loom. A gate loom is just a pretty rigid heddle. Join me in this class to learn the history of the looms and weavers and learn to weave a band that can be used for dog leashes and collars, belts, headbands, book marks, curtain tie backs or upholstery trim. You will learn to measure and cut the warp, tie it up, and weave a band. Then in the afternoon, we will "pick it up" a notch and earn how to change designs to better fit your needs, plan your own design, calculate materials, and then how to "pick up" threads to make more intricate beautiful patterns. These bands can be used to trim the front of a knitted or woven garment, make matching handles for a felted bag, or in any application where both beauty and practicality is needed. \$35 materials fee covers Rigid Heddle, 2 types of shuttles, back strap system, warp for pick up, patterns and handouts.

(wool, Mohair, silk only please...) to throw into the dye pot after our yarns have finished (small amounts). Cochineal dyes always have several exhaust baths that can be used. One lucky student will go home with the remaining cochineal dye bath. \$20 materials fee covers cochineal and the yarns.

Students should bring: Please bring a notebook and pen/pencil for note taking while you are working. Wear old clothes or aprons and bring gloves.

You will find this to be a fun technique, just like playing with mud. Everyone will learn about the history and cultural significance of this unique dye form as they dye material that students chose. process of pre-fix the material. You are welcome to dye multiple items in a session (material fee will be charged accordingly). This is not a soaking dye, so be ready to knead the material as well as being creative! You can play with the material by knotting, folding, tie-dyeing. I will bring 12 colors of dye and some tools for you to play with. Let's have fun dyeing. There will be shawls, scarves, socks and t-shirts to choose from to dye and you may choose multiple items to work with. If you bring your own items to dye, the dye fee will be charged depending on the weight of the material and range between \$3 to \$10. You may purchase items to dye from the Instructor - cotton/silk scarves, cotton shawls, socks and T-shirts- and the cost of these items will range from \$10 to \$15. *Materials fees may total from \$13 to \$25 dependent on items of clothing and dyes purchased at class. Come and have fun being creative! If you have a latex allergy, this is not a good class for you as there is rubber latex is in the dye.



405 - Band Weaving Pick Up With Double Slot Reed

I could crochet and knit as a child but preferred knitting... lots of sewing... and beads, don't know at what age I actually started any of it but, it was always in my life. In the 60's we moved our young family to the country and soon began raising sheep, having our own fiber fit right in and along came spinning and weaving in the 70's. I began loom weaving in the early 80's and soon started giving workshops which led to teaching weaving at Carl Sandburg College in Illinois, Over time I've broken down many types of weaving to simple workshops giving them at places like Dickson Mounds Native American Museum, at major festivals like the Michigan Fiber Fest, Wisconsin Spin In, Illinois, Indiana and several fiber events in Missouri. Walk and Knit Relay Challenge

Saturday – 4:30 PM (See Map)



This Walk and Knit event was inspired by a similar team-relay race that takes place in Estonia, known there as Käi ja Koo. Join together with your friends (teams of four) in this friendly, fun, fast-paced, walking and knitting event. OR sign up individually and we will put a team together for you. Proceeds from this event will support youth activities related to wool. If you can't walk and chew gum at the same time, come and watch as teams take on the challenge of knitting while walking, and cheer on your favorite team.

Walk and Knit Rules:

- Each team will have one knitting project to work. The yarn ball is kept in a knitting project bag, hanging on the competitor's wrist.
 The bag and knitting will be handed over from one team member to another at the end of each lap, as in a relay race.
- Each team member walks one lap about 100 yards long, while knitting in stockinette stitch on circular needles.
- Points will be given to each team based on the number of stitches
 knit (higher number of stitches = more points) and the time to
 finish the course (faster time = more points), and points will be
 subtracted for errors (dropped stitches, etc). The team with the
 most points wins.
- Teams will be composed of four members (at the discretion of the judges, teams with fewer members may participate and individual members may walk more than one lap so that a total of four laps are completed by each team)
- Supplies (yarn, circular needles, knitting project bags) will be provided by organizers.
- All team members must report to Walk & Knit Way (the road just south of WOW Classes Bldg #1) between 4:00-4:15 on Saturday. The event will take place on Walk & Knit Way beginning at 4:30 pm.
- Before the start, each team's knitting project will be prepared, with 100 stitches cast on and the first four rounds knit using sport-weight yarn and size 5 circular needles.
- The race is taking place on an asphalt surface. Please wear suitable footwear and be aware that knitting needles can be hazardous. Festival and organizers are not liable for injuries.

Admission is charged at the gates Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Check catalog schedule for gate hours. Daily admission is \$8 per person, kids 8 and under FREE. Weekend passes at \$15 per person may be purchased at the Gate. Sheep exhibitors receive gate passes at the discretion of the sheep show superintendent.
- 2. Eligibility: The WSBC Carcass Competition is open to wether or ewe lambs, commercial or purebred. The average weight of a pen of three lambs at entry must be between 115 and 175 pounds per lamb. Lambs must have between 3/8 inch and 1 inch of fleece by festival. No muzzles, drenching, cold water baths, ice wraps, blanketing, patch shearing, coloring, or fitting permitted. Lambs may not be tied in the pen.
- 3. Health Certificates: NOTE: Sheep originating from outside Wisconsin must be accompanied by a currently valid certificate of veterinary inspection for interstate movement, to be submitted at check-in. Sheep showing any symptoms of contagious or infectious disease will not be permitted to be unloaded, shown or exhibited. All sheep entries must comply with USDA scrapie regulations and programs and must be identified with official, individual scrapie identification.
- 4. Disease symptoms: Any evidence of sore mouth, ringworm, foot rot, pink eye, wool fungus or any other contagious diseases will eliminate all entries transported by that exhibitor, which will then not be permitted to unload or show.
- 5. Drug Withdrawal: Persons entering sheep in the Carcass Competition will be responsible for observing the required and/or recommended withdrawal times for any and all feed additives, antibiotics, dewormers, vaccines or any compounds fed to the lambs they have entered into this competition. Any evidence to the contrary uncovered at any stage of this competition may result in immediate or

- eventual disqualification of the lambs and/or carcasses and may cause an exhibitor to be banned from future competitions or the forfeiture of any and all premiums or payments. (See Statement of Liability)
- Inspection: All sheep subject to inspection prior to unloading.
- 7. Identification: All lambs entered must have birth dates recorded upon arrival. All sheep entries must comply with USDA scrapie regulations and programs and must be identified with official, individual scrapie identification.
- 8. All Pens Assigned: Pens will be assigned by show Superintendent. Due to limited available penning, tack pens may not be allowed. Please plan accordingly. Pen cards will be provided.
- 9. Feeding/care: Feeding and care of lambs until they leave the grounds for harvesting is solely the responsibility of the exhibitor. Shavings will be provided as bedding.
- **10. Judging:** Lambs will judged in their respective pens on Sunday morning by a panel of judges.
- 11. Carcass Lamb: A single lamb from each pen of three will be selected by the panel of judges to be harvested, and the meat purchased, by the University of Wisconsin Meats Lab. Carcass data will be taken by University of Wisconsin-Madison Meats Lab staff and faculty and carcasses placed by standard and established indexing criteria. NOTE: If less than four pens of lambs are entered, all lambs will be harvested.
- 12. Market Lambs: The remaining two lambs in each pen of

- three will be transported to Equity Co-op at Johnson Creek on Sunday evening.
- **13. Payment for Lambs:** Payment for all lambs will be made by purchaser directly to the exhibitor and address on the entry.
- 14. Contest Results: Live placings will be announced at 1:00 p.m. Sunday afternoon in the Activity Center. Carcass contest results will be announced in the Fall Issue of the Wisconsin Shepherd and awards presented at the 2017 Arlington Sheep Day-Wisconsin Sheep Breeders Co-op Annual Meeting in Arlington, Wisconsin.
- 15. Awards: Premium payout to 10th place. A traveling trophy and \$200 will be presented to the top live placing pen at 2017 Arlington Sheep Day. A \$200 Award will be presented to the exhibitor of the top placing carcass lamb. A \$100 bonus will be added if the top placing carcass lamb is part of the first place live placing pen.

No sheep showing any symptoms of contagious or infectious disease will be permitted to be unloaded, shown or exhibited. All sheep entries must comply with USDA scrapie regulations and programs and must be identified with official, individual scrapie identification. 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
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
