


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HOW WE GOT HERE

The Wisconsin Sheep Breeders Cooperative got its start following the Civil War when sheep numbers in Wisconsin totaled over one million head, the predominant breed being Merino. The origin of the Cooperative was the Wisconsin Merino Sheep Breeders Association which was formed in 1877 to start a breed registry. Two years later, that association merged with a state wool growers group and the Wisconsin State Wool Growers & Sheep Breeders Association was born. Its first president was James Webster of Dodge County and the objectives were the "encouragement and protection of the sheep breeding and wool growing interests of the state....," protection meaning legislative pushback against wool imports.

In 1904 the Wisconsin Sheep **Breeders Association was** formed, its primary purpose the selection of judges for the Wisconsin State Fair. In 1951 that association sponsored its first bred ewe sale and later began the Wisconsin Ram Test Station in an effort to improve rate of gain genetics for both purebred and commercial flocks. In 1981 the association became the Wisconsin Sheep Breeders Cooperative, a 501C5 promoting producer and youth education, along with scholarship opportunities. It has been a member of the American **Sheep Industry Association** (ASI) since 1985, a national organization providing legislative and promotional presence for the sheep industry, grants for promotion and producer education and insurance coverage for its state member associations.

In 1977 the forerunner to ASI initiated the Blueprint for Expansion, an ambitious effort, the goal of which was to double sheep numbers in the U.S. in ten years. Each state established its own expansion program and in Wisconsin it was an unqualified success, increasing stock ewe numbers by 54% in the first four years. The Blueprint for Expansion was also the impetus for the Wisconsin Sheep **Industry Conference which** began in 1979, the forerunner to the Wisconsin Sheep & Wool Festival. The Wisconsin Sheep **Industry Conference became** the largest producer conference in the country, attracting over one thousand

participants at its

in decline, the Wisconsin Sheep Breeders Co-op board made the decision to change what had been solely a producer oriented gathering to a festival format, opening it to the general public. Through the enthusiasm and initiative of over one hundred volunteers the festival has grown to become the premier such event in the Midwest, drawing the support of thousands of fiber enthusiasts, sheep exhibitors, stock dog handlers. We are proud to have partnered with Jefferson County Fair Park for twenty four years.

The history of the sheep industry in Wisconsin is one of resilience and initiative, pivoting to meet the many challenges of animal agriculture in the twenty first century. 





By purchasing admission, registering for classes or participating in any event, activity, livestock show, competitions, demonstrations and/or entering the premises, attendees agree to all regulations, restrictions and guidelines as set forth below and/or duly posted by the Wisconsin Sheep Breeders Cooperative, Wisconsin Sheep & Wool Festival, LLC (Festival) and/or regulations as set forth by the Jefferson County Fair Park, Jefferson County Health Department and Jefferson County, Wisconsin.

- All persons enter at their own risk.
- No soliciting, polling, campaigning.
- No firearms permitted on the fairgrounds.
- Controlled substances prohibited on the fairgrounds at all times.
- Smoking prohibited in all fairgrounds buildings at all times.
- No alcoholic beverages allowed during festival hours
- Parents/Guardians are responsible for the supervision of all minors.
- Exhibitors/participants in Festival shows, competitions, classes, demonstrations and activities participate at their own risk and may be disqualified and lose awards, premiums and/or lose eligibility to exhibit and or participate at the Wisconsin Sheep & Wool Festival for failure to follow the rules.
- No distribution or posting of printed materials/
 flyers/advertisements except as specifically
 allowed by Festival or Jefferson County Fair
 Park management.
- Leave your pets at home! Pets are not allowed at the Wisconsin Sheep & Wool Festival and will be denied entry to the festival. Only certified service dogs, service dogs in training and those entered in the Crook & Whistle Stock Dog Trial will be allowed on the grounds during festival hours. Dogs belonging to permitted campers must remain at a campsite during festival hours.

- The Wisconsin Sheep & Wool Festival, LLC, Jefferson County Fair Park and the Wisconsin Sheep Breeders Cooperative are not responsible for lost articles or damage to personal property. Report any loss or damage to the Jefferson County Fair Park Office.
- All vendor sales of merchandise, food and/ or services are by express permission of the Wisconsin Sheep & Wool Festival, LLC.
- No demonstrations of any kind are allowed.
- No bikes, skateboards, roller blades, scooters, golf carts or motorized bikes are allowed on the Festival grounds during hours of operation for the event without express permission of Jefferson County Fair Park or Festival management.
- No drones, except by express permission of the Festival.

or injury to any other person(s) or property caused by the exhibitor, vendor, or person(s) displaying items for educational, exhibition or instructional reasons, or any of the animals exhibited by persons or arising out of, or in any way connected with such exhibition of any of the animals, products or items exhibited, displayed or offered for sale.

The care, feeding, safe handling and safety of all animals brought to the Wisconsin Sheep & Wool Festival shall be the sole responsibility of the person or persons exhibiting, displaying or managing such animals, including sheep for display, entered in competition, or for educational and demonstration purposes; dogs entered in a stock dog trial or stock dog demonstration; or any animal as part of or incidental to a vendor display. Exhibitors and handlers must provide their own feed, bedding, and water for animals in their care. The Wisconsin Sheep & Wool Festival, LLC shall provide exhibitors, handlers and vendors with assigned space for their displays and exhibits subject to such rules and regulations as may be prescribed. By providing such space, the Festival shall not insure, nor be responsible for, the safety of such animals, or the person or persons tending them.

Accepted Entries

In all cases, the Wisconsin Sheep & Wool Festival, LLC reserves the right to reject, accept, or conditionally accept any entry, registration or consignment and does not guarantee space in any show, demonstration, trial or display to any entry, as it is intended that only such animals shall be entered and shown as have merit, will be a credit to both the exhibitor and Festival, and are judged not to pose any health risk to other livestock, their handlers and other exhibitors. In all matters related to acceptance of entries, decisions shall be at the discretion of the superintendent in charge of the respective activity, show or exhibition. Any exhibitor who knowingly makes a material misrepresentation may be barred from all future competitions at this event.

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


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HOW TO BROWSE & REGISTER

REGISTER BY AUGUST 1 TO RECEIVE A WEEKEND GATE PASS (worth \$20). Registrations after August 1 will require you to purchase a day pass (\$10) or weekend pass (\$20) to get onto festival grounds; this is instead of a late registration fee.

(REGISTRATIONS REMAIN OPEN AFTER AUGUST 1 AND UNTIL EACH CLASS IS FILLED OR CANCELED) SOME CLASSES MAY HAVE SAMEDAY REGISTRATIONS AVAILABLE- CHECK AT THE WONDERS OF WOOL REGISTRATION DESK (BUILDING 1) FOR MORE INFORMATION.

NO REFUNDS AFTER AUGUST 15 UNLESS A CLASS IS CANCELED.

Bookeo is our Registration Program, it is best viewed on a desk computer, laptop, or tablet.

HOW TO BROWSE AND REGISTER-

Go to www.bookeo.com/wswfwow THINGS TO LOOK FOR:

- SOLD OUT = Class is SOLD OUT and WAITLIST is FULL
- WAITLIST = Class is SOLD OUT, but spots remain on the WAITLIST
 - Waitlists are ½ the total number of seats available; if a class has 10 students, the waitlist will be no more than five people
 - As seats become available, the system will automatically begin contacting the waitlist, starting from the first person signed up, and will move on to the next person every 24 hours until it is filled or the list is exhausted
 - If the class takes place in 5 days or less, the open spot is sent to the whole waitlist at the same time and is filled first-come-first-served
 - If no one on the wait list signs up, the seat is re-listed as available publicly
- BOOK NOW = Class has open seats
- SEARCH CLASSES: Classes can be searched by category, instructor, class number, or day. Multi-day classes are listed separately on the multi-day class tab
- 2. LEARN MORE: Use the (i) button to access tabs that provide detailed class descriptions, materials fees, required experience level, and additional project photos. On a phone, it may be a small grey (i) button above a blue arrow on the right side of the screen. Try viewing the page in portrait mode; some phones will automatically convert the (i) button into an INFO button, making it easier to see. Class not for you? Hit "Cancel" or "Ok" to return to the main schedule.



can be quickly grown in our region, and another brought in from outside our area. We will discuss natural dyes, how to mordant and dye, water impacts, safety aspects, equipment, and more. We will make the dye baths and dye samples (no mordant, alum, copper, iron, tin, and rhubarb leaf) and treat them with four different after-treatments (acid, alkali, copper, and iron) to obtain samples showing the wide ranges of shades of color which can be obtained from a single dye. Students will take home a sample card showing sample yarns of all the mordants and after treatments for the two dyes. After dyeing the samples, students will get two 50 gm skeins of pre-mordanted sport or worsted weight yarn to dye in their choice of dye baths. Examples of projects for 100 gm of yarn will be available. Probable dyes for this class are cochineal and osage orange.
